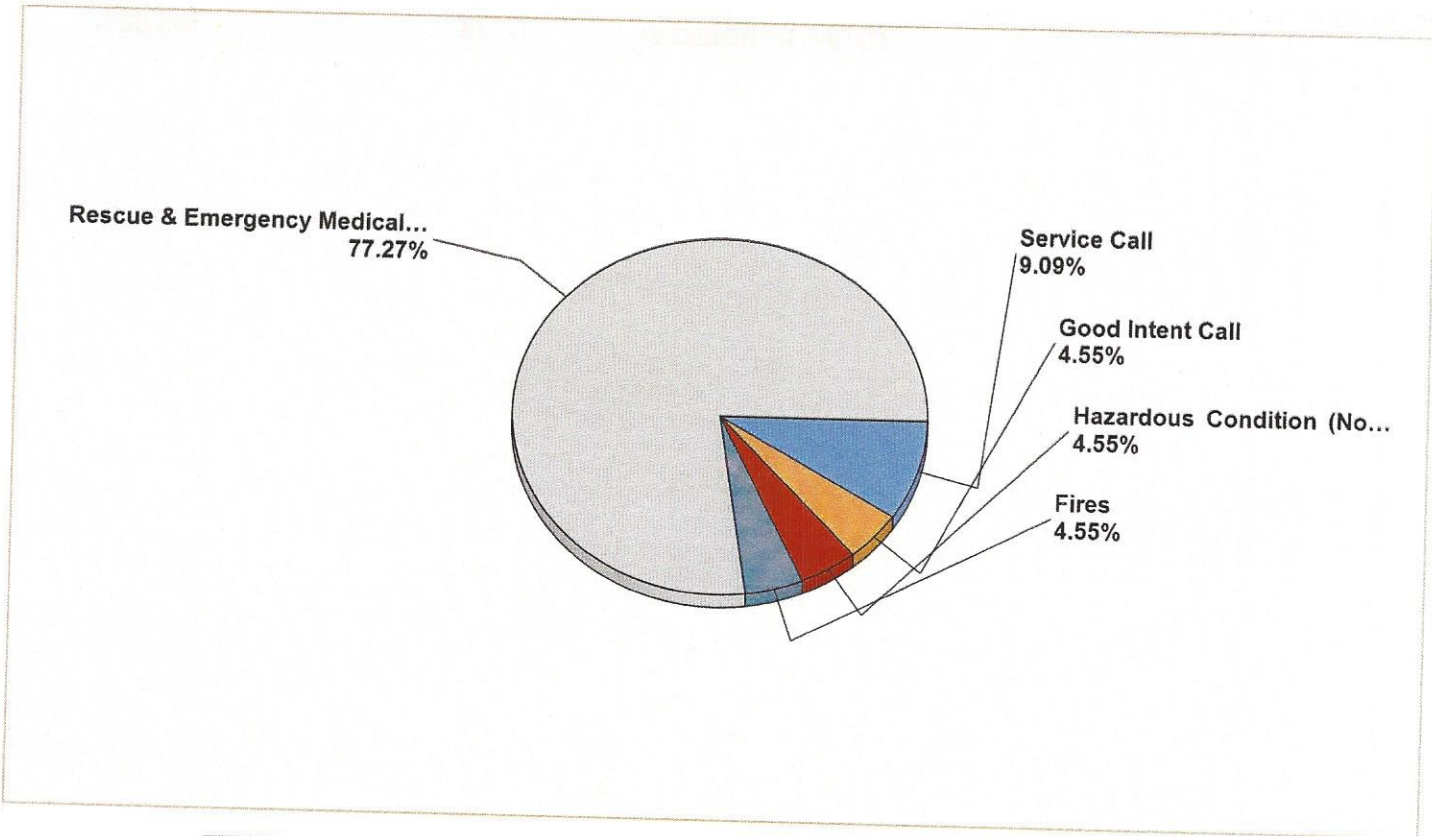

Call coverage 69%, 12 members responded to one call only, one member responded to 12, one to 7, one to 6, one to 4, one to 3 and one to 2.

Engine 362 was out of service 5 days in February.

Training was held 4 times with an average attendance of 7.25 members.

Current staffing: 16 Total, 9 Local, 7 Out of town.

Conducted a well attended station clean up day.

I attended Fire House West in San Diego to look for new opportunities, equipment and technology for the Department.

I have spent considerable time this month on two projects. First looking at options to improve our radio coverage and ability to receive calls. This critical to maintaining the present ISO. It is also key to the safety of our personnel. Second, has been looking at market and options for selling Rescue 392 (ambulance) and purchase a light rescue vehicle that will seat 5, carry our rescue tools, and fight incipient level fires. This will reduce mileage on Engine 392. We are currently at the top of the list to obtain such a vehicle from SB County Fire, possibly for \$1.00. The unit we are looking at will require a new pump / engine skid as the unit it currently has a "blown engine". At a cost of around \$16,000 we can set in a new skid that will draft at 600gpm as compared to 200gpm as equipped.
